How can Interprofessional Education (IPE) prepare students for rapidly evolving healthcare environments in a volatile, uncertain and complex world?

Interprofessional Education (IPE) is essential in modern medical education, emphasising collaboration among healthcare professionals to improve patient outcomes. Many medical schools have integrated IPE into their curricula with courses, simulations, and clinical rotations, supported by WHO and Interprofessional Collaborative Practice guidelines. In today's volatile, uncertain, complex, and ambiguous world, universities must prepare students for rapidly evolving healthcare environments through interdisciplinary approaches.

IPE fosters better communication, improved patient outcomes, reduced errors, and enhanced teamwork. However, challenges like curriculum integration, institutional resistance, effectiveness measurement, and resource allocation remain. The future of IPE is promising, with trends such as interprofessional leadership, advanced technologies, international collaborations, and supportive policies driving progress.

The National University of Singapore (NUS) introduced an interdisciplinary curriculum for Dentistry, Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy in August 2023, aligning with Singapore's 'Healthier SG' vision of integrated, preventative healthcare. NUS Medicine equips graduates with the knowledge and skills to thrive in collaborative settings. IPE is vital for a collaborative healthcare environment that benefits patients. Continued advancements and a commitment to interprofessional collaboration promise to transform healthcare delivery. This presentation will discuss NUS Medicine's journey and learnings, focusing on health professional courses at NUS.

He has contributed a commentary as the lead author on interprofessional education, as part of the Lancet Commission report on medical education in 2022. With an extensive publication record in health professions education, Dujeepa serves as the Editor-in-Chief of the Asia Pacific Medical Education Journal and is a visiting faculty member at several universities worldwide.
